Getting to know Auburn's new mayor, Ron Anders, Jr.



Ron Anders, Jr. was elected in October to serve as Auburn's new mayor, stepping into the position held for 20 years by former Mayor Bill Ham, Jr. After six years on the Auburn City Council and years of service to the community, Mayor Anders was sworn into office in early November.

Anders was first appointed to the Auburn City Council to fill an unexpired term for the Ward 2 councilperson in November 2012. He finished out the term and was re-elected in 2014 to serve another four years. At that time, Anders was selected as mayor pro tem of the council and filled in for former Mayor Ham when needed.

For the last three years, Anders has served as the director of special projects for Tailgate Guys' Auburn Crew. Previously, he worked as the business development director for Rabren General Contractors and was the owner and CEO of Anders Bookstore in Auburn for 20 years.

A lifelong resident of Auburn, Anders has been a longtime active member of the community. He has served as past chair, past president, past director and past board member for a number of civic, community, recreation and charitable organizations. He currently serves as the director and president of several recreational organizations.

Anders is a 1982 graduate of Auburn High School and a 1986 graduate of Auburn University. He lives in Auburn with his wife, Becky, with whom he has three children, Joshua, Patrick and Camille. You can reach Anders at randers@auburnalabama.org or (334) 703-9000.

New council begins four-year term, sets meeting procedures

With approximately 22 hours of orientation sessions under their belt, members of the 2018-2022 Auburn City Council have stepped into their role as representatives of Auburn residents and policy makers for the City of Auburn.

The new council was sworn into office on Nov. 5 and subsequently held a meeting to elect a mayor pro tem, who steps in to assist the Mayor with scheduling and other duties when the need arises. Ward 3 Councilperson Beth Witten was selected to serve as the 2018-2022 mayor pro tem.

New task forces

During the first meeting of the new council, Mayor Ron Anders announced the formation of four task forces to tackle emerging issues. Two council members were appointed to each task force, including:

- Boards and Commissions Task Force led by Ward 2 Councilperson Kelley Griswold and Ward 3 Councilperson Beth Witten. This task force will evaluate the application process for the City's 22 boards and commissions. Information about the application process can be found at auburnalabama.org/boards. Any changes to the application process will be represented here as they are approved by the council.
- Diversity Task Force led by Ward 1 Councilperson Connie Taylor and Ward 5 Councilperson Steven Dixon. Taylor and Dixon will focus on recommendations to the whole

council that ensure the views and concerns of all facets of the Auburn community are considered.

- Short-Term Rentals Task Force led by Ward 4 Councilperson Brett Smith and Ward 6 Councilperson Bob Parsons. As short-term rentals become more popular and prevalent in Auburn, this task force will work with citizens and City staff to move forward with creating regulations for short-term rentals in City limits, which will be recommended to the whole council at a future date
- Student Housing Task Force led by Ward 7 Councilperson Jay Hovey and Ward 8 Councilperson Tommy Dawson. Hovey and Dawson will work with various community leaders and City staff to understand and evaluate student housing needs in Auburn.

Task force meetings will be advertised so that the public may attend to listen to the discussion. Please visit auburnalabama.org/meeting-schedule for a calendar of currently scheduled public meetings.

The council also approved some changes to the order of business for City Council meetings to help improve efficiency during meetings and create more avenues for citizens to address the council. The following changes began at the council's Nov. 20 meeting:

Many chances for citizen input

Previously, there were only two chances for citizens to address the council: Citizens' Communications and public hearings. Now, the public will have three opportunities to address the council: two designated citizen communications times and public hearings required for certain agenda items.

The first opportunity, Citizens' Communications on Agenda Items, will be held near the beginning of the meeting. Anyone may address the council for five minutes during this time about items on the current agenda, only.

The second opportunity, Citizens' Open Forum, will be held at the end of the meeting. At this time, the public may address the council for three minutes about any topic.

The third opportunity, public hearings, will continue to be scheduled for items as required. There is no limit to how long a citizen can speak to the item during a public hearing.

Introduction of a consent agenda

Another change includes the consideration of a consent agenda, which will save time by allowing a group of



routine and non-controversial items to be approved with a single motion.

Consent agenda items may include previous meeting minutes, alcoholic beverage license requests, board appointments, contracts and agreements and right-of-way and easement dedications. Ordinances or agenda items that require a public hearing will not be included on the consent agenda. The council may remove any item from the consent agenda if it wishes to discuss an item further or vote on an item separate from the consent agenda.

Single-stream recycling carts on their way

Those without single-stream recycling carts who chose to participate in the program will receive carts throughout the remainder of the year. Environmental Services began distributing carts the last weekend of November and will continue distributing them on Fridays and Saturdays throughout December. All carts will be distributed by January 2019. Once all carts are out, the City will no longer provide source-separated recycling—only single-stream recycling will be available for pickup.

Plastics #1-7, aluminum and steel cans, newspaper, cardboard, magazines and mixed paper are accepted in the single-stream program. Remember, the Recycling Drop-Off Center is available 24/7 at 365-A N. Donahue Drive for those who are ineligible for single-stream recycling and for items not accepted in single-stream like batteries (transistor up to size D), cell phones, cooking grease/oil and glass.
